

The peg that used to be there was a new Hiatt which was removed last March by abseil. I wonder who could do a thing like that.

The companion to this route is "Mangoletsi" somewhat harder in standard and even better in quality. The orange tape on the slab should be ignored for there are excellent quartz footholds up to the roof. Protection from small wire wedges is very good.

Thil Caley climbed "Pincushion", another fine slab route. In my opinion Tremadoc has been the best bet for dry rock during the past two months. In the Lakes the clouds have been low and the rock quite slippery; I believe Rupert nipped into Gimmer recently and climbed "Poacher" E.S.

In the interests of stimulating good, clean competition and not self-advertisement the Editor has, since Easter, led "DVM" HVS, 'DIADIC'ES, "VECTOR" ES, "NIMBUS" HVS, "PELLAGRA" ES, "MANGOLETSI" ES, and "GUNEAGLE" ES.

# CRAIG Y FORMYN - N. WALES

If in Wales and you get washed out of Snowdonia or blown off Anglesey, then try this place — it's on your way home. A few miles east of Colwyn Bay is the village of Llanddulas; from the church take a narrow road inland (south) keeping right at junctions (ignore the narrow road that comes in very sharply on the right at a rectangular sign board). After 2 or 3 miles a caravan sight appears on the left; park further on; obvious tracks lead up to the crag through the woods.

The rock is excellent mountain limestone affording a variety of superb routes up to 160' in length - all V.S. to extreme. There are a couple of rotton gullies at severe standard. The easier routes tend to be strenuous whilst the harderroutes are both strenuous and technical; protection is good.

Mojo is a good introduction to the harder routes going at mild extreme. There is a worthwhile guide that inclues this area: "Climbs on North Wales Limestone" by Rowland Edwards.

#### ANGLESEY AND SEA BIRDS

R.S.P.B. wardens patrol certain areas of the Anglescy Cliffs: signs have been established to inform climbers of the protected areas (Mousetrap Zawn - Feb to July). If you ignore these signs and later spy a warden heading your way expect him to be as mad as hell.
