SCOTTISH WINTER 1999 Part 1 – MEAGAIDH MEMORIES

Our new editor is really taking her job too seriously. Hanging around Tolley's abode in early evening in an attempt to blagg an article from **me** is really going too far. So here it is, the true story of making the most of a Scottish winter's day. You know, last man off the crag and all that.

Perhaps leaving Langangarbh at 7.00am was a little late. We were in fact first out but then again we were driving to Creag Meagaidh, a hill I'd heard so much about but never seen, let alone been on.

A long but steady march in glorious sunshine brought us third team in line at the bottom of South Post Direct. I was the team and Adrian my trusty leader, not that it needed saying. It was Adrian's suggestion for the hill and route. Centre Post was vacant and looked OK to me but was discounted by my leader as a boring snow plod and the others in view looked most intimidating as in fact did the one I was at the bottom of.

We waited perhaps 30 minutes after gearing up before it was Adrian's turn to set off up the first near vertical ice pitch. He climbed confidently but a little slow for the team behind who were itching to get going and making hints about benightment etc. Well you know my speed of climbing and never having successfully negotiated an ice pitch of this calibre before and being ever the gentleman I said go ahead. Perhaps our second mistake. So much spindrift and ice was being deposited on us from above and this got worse throughout the climb.

I was so chuffed at getting up this first pitch without falling off. A full rope length as well. Having climbed the next two or three pitches of steep frozen snow, including a short ice wall we arrived at the bottom of the crux ice pitch. We had now become the fourth team on the route and seemed to have to wait for ages before we could get going again. Neither my leader nor I for that matter had any real problem it was just the continual clouds of spindrift that engulfed us and me climbing very slowly, worrying whether or not my front points and gently curved ice axe pick would stay in place.

Well we topped out in a howling gale, near white out with all the spindrift swirling around and it just about to go dark. My calves were pumping and I was knackered absolutely. We got out our head torches, Adrian's was on the blink despite a new battery he had just fitted. With Phil Lee's 1:25000 map I had aquired with surprising forethought and my compass we planned our descent. Adrian argued for the descent gully that he knew from previous visits but I was a little anxious about this. I lost my compass whilst trying to sort out the ropes and other clutter that was slowly strangling us and as I did not have my spectacles (age now definitely showing) Adrian took over the navigation.

With his headtorch working intermittently and the occasional flash from the camera swinging from his harness we skirted the crags westwards. We actually found a gully but with visibility down to only a few metres we weren't sure if this was the descent gully or not so we carried on our bearing west eventually finding a line of posts. We rested a while here to remove the ropes which were continually wrapping themselves around us, and to have our lunch. Undoing frozen knots wearing mitts in a mighty wind is quite an absorbing task.

At this point three Scottish lads appeared out of the gloom having just climbed Smiths Route. They were following the same bearing as us but didn't have a map. Between us we reached (as Blair later informed me) the window and we dropped down to the valley and stream and another rest. All we now needed to do was to pick up the path a short distance above the other side of the stream and we'd be back in no time for a well - earned pint. Could we find the blessed path? As we weren't exactly sure of our position we had to make do with following the stream down to where we parked the car (and a hell of a slog it was too).

We reached the car at about 12.15am knowing that there'd be no beer for us that night. In Fort William we stopped for petrol and discovered that the pubs close at 1.00am on a Saturday night. We had passed a number of hostelries and now we had only 3 minutes to find somewhere, typical. We headed back to Langangarbh to find ourselves locked out. Five minutes of banging and shouting brought Blair, the culprit, to the door. At about 3.00am and after some food we crawled to our pits. A 23 hour day complete, on what I only learned on the descent to be a grade V,4 route. My first big mountain route and good training it was for our next day out.
